EU-MALAYSIA JOINT PRESS RELEASE ON EU DEFORESTATION-FREE REGULATION (EUDR) AND THE MALAYSIAN SUSTAINABLE PALM OIL (MSPO) CERTIFICATION SCHEME

- 1. The EU and Malaysia will continue to work closely together on the implementation of the forthcoming EU Deforestation-Free Regulation (EUDR), and how Malaysia's sustainable certification standard for palm oil (MSPO) provides readiness and assurances under EUDR for supply chain partners and regulators in the EU.
- 2. On 24 April 2024, under the format of a virtual conference, the EU Commissioner for Environment and Fisheries, Mr. Virginijus Sinkevičius and Malaysia's Minister of Plantation and Commodities, Datuk Seri Johari Abdul Ghani discussed the EUDR and the role of MSPO.
- 3. Commissioner Sinkevičius commended Malaysia's efforts to bring deforestation levels down to unprecedented low levels, and acknowledged Malaysia's commitment to certified sustainable commodity production. The EU remains an important market for sustainably-produced Malaysian commodities.
- 4. The two parties agreed to renew their efforts to ensure the current positive trade flows between Malaysia and the EU will continue uninterrupted. Both parties wished for continued fruitful cooperation to ensure legality and sustainability of key commodities through the Joint Task Force on EUDR that was established in 2023.
- 5. Commissioner Sinkevičius stressed the EU's readiness to continue working jointly with Malaysia towards enhancing deforestation-free supply chains. In this context, the EU will support the nationally mandated sustainable production of Malaysian palm oil in compliance with EUDR requirements. Malaysian oil palm planted area comprises of large estates (73%) and smallholders (27%).
- 6. Minister Johari emphasised the role of the MSPO certification scheme in strengthening efforts to meet EUDR requirements, which includes global sustainability requirements, namely, traceability, deforestation-free, legitimate land title and good labour practices.
- 7. Minister Johari stressed that Malaysia remains steadfast in its commitment to attaining sustainability targets and adhering to global standards. Commissioner Sinkevičius welcomed this commitment and signalled the EU's support for Malaysia's efforts.

Background

The EU Deforestation Regulation (EUDR) aims at contributing to the global fight against deforestation and forest degradation by addressing both legal and illegal deforestation. It responds to the commitment made by the international community to end deforestation (SDGs, Glasgow Declaration, etc.). It covers seven commodities (rubber, wood, cattle, palm oil, soya, coffee and cocoa) produced in the EU or abroad. It creates due diligence and strict traceability obligations for companies to clean their supply chains from products associated with deforestation and forest degradation.

Against the background of the triple planetary crisis of biodiversity loss, climate change and environment pollution, Malaysia and the European Union have a mutual interest and important role in promoting viable pathways for development and prosperity that do not contribute to the depletion of our environment.

Taking action against deforestation and forest degradation is crucial for tackling climate change and biodiversity loss. Deforestation and forest degradation account for about 11% of anthropogenic greenhouse gas emissions, and they are also among the top drivers of biodiversity loss.

Cooperative engagement and partnership is essential to address these critical global challenges.

As one of the main global producers of palm oil and rubber, as well as a key trading partner for the EU, Malaysia has a long-standing commitment to forest protection and sustainable commodity production, including the development of the mandatory Malaysian Sustainable Palm Oil (MSPO) certification standard. Cooperation between the European Union and Malaysia on sustainability and traceability of palm oil provides ongoing support to Malaysia's efforts. Initiatives include the KAMI project and the Joint Task Force on the EUDR.

Commitment to this cooperation was confirmed during the virtual meeting between Commissioner Virginijus Sinkevičius, EU Commissioner for Environment, Maritime Affairs and Fisheries and Malaysia's Minister for Plantation Commodities Mr. Datuk Seri Johari Abdul Ghani.
